**THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION

**PURPOSE:** The American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies, Inc., is a professional organization which seeks to advance scholarly study, publication, and teaching relating to the Soviet Union and eastern Europe. It is a nonprofit, nonpolitical group which serves its members through various publications and related activities.

**PUBLICATIONS:** The principal publication of the "Triple A Double S" is the *SLAVIC REVIEW: American Quarterly of Soviet and East European Studies*. The *Review* carries scholarly articles dealing with all parts of the Soviet and east European area and representing the various academic disciplines of the social sciences and humanities. The editorial offices of the *Review* are at Columbia University. The *Newsletter*, published twice a year at the University of Illinois, disseminates information on professional conferences, institutional developments, grants and fellowships offered and awarded, and other activities of individuals in the Slavic and east European field. *The American Bibliography of Russian and East European Studies*, an indispensable reference guide to books and articles in the field, is distributed yearly to each member of the Association by special arrangement with Indiana University. The Association's *Directory* contains a biographical entry on each member as well as supplementary listings by geographical location and by discipline.

**MEETINGS:** To supplement the sessions relating to the Soviet Union and eastern Europe that are normally a part of the annual conventions of the various associations in the disciplines, the AAASS encourages interdisciplinary meetings on a local and on a regional basis. The Association welcomes the formation of chapters or branches by groups on their own initiative, and assists such efforts in any way possible. The regional and other affiliated groups meet normally at least once a year. The Association holds its national conventions less frequently. The first was in 1964 in New York.

**MEMBERSHIP:** Membership in the Association is open to all persons interested in furthering Slavic, east European, and Soviet bloc studies. Regular memberships are \$12 per year and sustaining memberships are \$25 per year. A special student rate of \$5 per year (without vote) is available to persons who are full-time students only. (Higher postage costs unfortunately limit the \$5 rate to those with U.S. mailing addresses. Students elsewhere may join as regular members.) There are also nonvoting associate memberships at \$12 per year. A new rate of \$5 has been added this year for members who have reached emeritus status. All classes of membership receive the quarterly *Slavic Review*, the annual *American Bibliography of Russian and East European Studies*, and the twice yearly *Newsletter*, plus the *Directory* in those years when one is published.

## THE SOVIET BLOC

Unity and Conflict

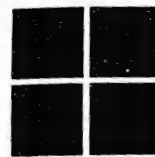
